HISTORY

James Project of Latin America was founded in 2001, for the purpose of fulfilling the biblical mandate of James 1:27, "...caring for widows and orphans in their distress." JPLA is a Guatemalan nonprofit that houses, feeds, educates, and disciples approximately 70 children that have been rescued from abandonment/neglect, physical abuse, sexual abuse, and trafficking. The organization also works with shingle moms and widow in the process of restoring hope in their lives, by providing spiritual and emotional counseling, education services, and business training.

JPLA TIMELINE

1999

The idea for James Project of Latin America was birthed

2001

JPLA filed papers to become an official Guatemalan nonprofit

2002

JPLA was officially approved to receive children from the court system

2003

Evangelical Freedom School began it's initial school year

2004

The land for our current site, located in Monjas, Jalapa, was purchased

2005

Construction for the first duplex (Casa Ester and Casa Ruth) began

2006

The first home was opened Construction on the 2nd duplex began (Casa Tabitha and Casa Deborah)

2007

The administration office was built on-site

2008

Evangelical Freedom School was built Construction on the 3rd duplex began (Casa Anna and Casa Abigail)

2011

The transition program and Casa Magdalena were implemented

2012

Construction began on the 1st boys home (Casa Pablo)

2013

The founders (Joanne Hartley and Carroll Bishop) retired Bryon and Tiffany Applegate became Directors The University Program began and our first students were enrolled

2014

The first boy's home was opened
The self-sustainability program was launched

2015

The aquaponics system began

2017

The Redeemed Women's program was launched The team house was built and opened on property

2018

The first Redeemed small business opened

2019

The 2nd boys' home was opened (Casa David) The foster program began for transition girls
